Dear Dr. Rosenbury and Ms. Milstein:

As you know, institutions of higher education have been scrutinized by the U.S. House of Representatives due to the ongoing and pervasive acts of antisemitic harassment and intimidation at colleges and universities across the country since October 7, 2023. We write to you today in anticipation of the upcoming fall semester to ask what policies, procedures, and concrete measures your University will be implementing to prevent a reoccurrence of the antisemitic chaos that swept across America's campuses last school year.

Last year many colleges and universities appeared caught off-guard by the protests, disruptions, threats, and encampments that flooded campus, often to the detriment of Jewish students. While that is no excuse for the failures we saw last year, colleges and universities are now acutely aware of the consequences across their campuses that stem from insufficient leadership. Refusals to impose basic discipline, hold bad actors accountable, and restore order on campus in the face of disruptions, violence, and hate will make life worse for all students, including Jewish students. Your institution, and those like it, must be prepared for the organized efforts directed at Jewish students that will likely come roaring back to life when students return to campus this fall. Allowing your campus to suffer massive disruptions, as happened last school year, makes it extremely difficult for students, especially Jewish students, to feel safe and receive an education.

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
