

## H.R. 4993, Joe Fiandra Access to Home Infusion Act Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA), Rep. Darren Soto (D-FL)

## **Background:**

- 6 in 10 Americans live with a chronic disease and 4 in 10 have two or more.
  - o Fortunately, **new and innovative technologies** coming to market have the potential to greatly improve treatments for those with chronic conditions.
- For example, **Amyloidosis is a previously fatal disease** that now has multiple treatment options, many of which are administered via infusion.
  - Amyloidosis affects nearly 200,000 patients across the U.S. and is among the many rare diseases that affect in total over 30 million Americans.
  - The disease now has multiple infusion treatments available to prevent against the fatal symptoms such as organ failure and debilitating neurological conditions.
- Army veteran Joe Fiandra, who this policy is named for, suffered from Amyloidosis and
  was confined to a wheelchair, limiting his ability to travel to his doctor's office for
  infusions.
  - Joe Fiandra encountered many difficulties during his fight with Amyloidosis that delayed treatment, increased time receiving treatments, and heightened his stress, resulting in a worse course of care.
- Unfortunately, Medicare currently does not cover certain drug infusions in the home, including those that treat Amyloidosis. Instead, if a Medicare beneficiary needs to receive these drugs, their only coverage option is to travel to a doctor's office for an infusion.

## H.R. 4993, Joe Fiandra Access to Home Infusion Act:

- Guarantees coverage of self-administered home infusion pumps and associated drugs under Medicare by clarifying relevant definitions.
- Additionally, **educates Medicare enrollees** on any cost sharing differences of choosing to receive drugs via home infusion.
