

H.R. 6504, Haiti Economic Lift Program Extension Act Rep. Murphy (R-NC)

Background:

- Haiti receives U.S. trade preferences for textile and apparel products through several trade programs, including the Caribbean Basin Initiative, the Caribbean Basin Trade Partnership Act, the Haitian Hemispheric Opportunity through Partnership Encouragement (HOPE) Act, and the Haiti Economic Lift Program (HELP) Act.
 - The HELP Act was passed by Congress in 2010 after a devastating earthquake in Haiti and expanded the scope of Haitian exports eligible for access to the U.S. market.
- The HOPE and HELP programs lapsed on September 30, following a 10-year renewal in 2015.
- An extended lapse in these programs could jeopardize Haiti's apparel
 manufacturing industry's ability to stay in Haiti, exacerbating the current
 political instability in the country, the poorest in the Western Hemisphere.
 Further, a worsening economic situation in Haiti could lead to increased
 migration from Haiti and increased security concerns in the U.S.
- Many U.S. companies rely on the HOPE/HELP programs to source apparel from Haiti. These supply chains are anchored in the Western Hemisphere, so apparel sourced from Haiti contains significantly more U.S. content, especially cotton.

H.R. XXXX, Haiti Economic Lift Program Extension Act:

- Renews duty-free treatment provided with respect to certain imports from Haiti under the HOPE/HELP programs for 3 years, until December 31, 2028.
- Also includes a technical update to ensure that the product coverage of this
 program is not inadvertently modified when periodic changes are made to the
 Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States.
- Renewal of these programs supports nearshoring and reshoring goals and does not impact the Trump Administration's tariff program—only the statutory tariff schedule that is set by Congress.
